



Langenburg is a town in the rural municipality of Langenburg, R.M. No. 181, located within the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities SARM Division No.1 and Census Division No.5, in the Canadian province of Saskatchewan. The Town of Langenburg is only 10 minutes from the Manitoba border along Yellowhead Trans-Canada Highway number 16 and is Saskatchewan's gateway community from the east. The full service town is a major agriculture centre and an important service centre for the area providing a wide range of business and retail services. Langenburg is within a 60 km radius from one of the the richest potash mines in the world and numerous beautiful regional and provincial parks that make Langenburg a great place to work and live.

The Community Profile summarizes the strengths of the community and gives prospective residents and entrepreneurs an overview of the character and potential of the Town of Langenburg and its service area. OUR HISTORY

According to the original settlers, this community was named after Prince Hohenlohe of Langenburg, a German nobleman who was said to have visited Western Canada in the 1880's and subsequently recommended this area to immigrants. It provided a new home for many Europeans. They came from many countries, lured by the abundance of cheap land and the promise of prosperity. The Langenburg district exemplifies the multi-ethnic diversity found Saskatchewan. German. British, Scandinavian and Belgium emigrants played major roles in the development of the community.

Langenburg has one of the best locations in Saskatchewan. We have good highway connections to neighbouring communities and the U.S. border. The town is located on Highway #16 that is the Saskatchewan section of the Yellowhead Highway, and the Trans-Canada Yellowhead Highway. The Trans-Canada Highway #1 is a principal highway in Canada and the world's longest national road. The road extends for 4,860 miles (7,821 km), between Victoria (Vancouver Island, British Columbia) and St. John's (Newfoundland, Newfoundland and Labrador) and is easily accessed in one hour from Langenburg. Highway number 8 connects Langenburg to the U.S. boarder. Langenburg is also located on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR).

CLIMATE

Langenburg has a prairie climate - warm summers, with average daily temperatures of 18 C (64F) in July and cold winters with average daily temperatures of -17 C (-0.2F) in January. Langenburg has lots of hours of sunshine.

LAND

The land surrounding Langenburg is gently to moderately rolling, sparsely wooded, and somewhat broken by small sloughs. These features, along with good drainage system and moisture-holding qualities make this area well-suited for grain growing and mixed farming. The soil is deep black loam over a subsoil of heavy clay. Yields of grain grown in this soil are consistently higher and more reliable than yields in other soils.

Rich deposits of potash lie to the south of Langenburg. Above those deposits lie the Blairmore formation - a 200 foot deep mass of clay, sand, shale, and water - and then other high pressure, water-bearing zones. Four producing Mosaic and Nutrien potash mines are located within a 60-km radius of Langenburg.



FRIENDLY PEOPLE

POPULATION

We are home to 1,165 people, plus 557 people who live in Langenburg R.M. No. 181.

The town's population growth rate is 1.5% per year. It is forecasted that in 2026 Langenburg will be home for more than 1,340 people.

The majority (98%) of our population speak English and were born in Canada (92%).


AGE

The largest population of Langenburg is the age group between 30 and 34. More than half (57.21%) of the population is in the working age group between 15 to 64 years old, while 34.35% make up the younger population which will be part of the labour force in less than 2 decades. The median age is 40.7.

MARITAL STATUS


The majority of our population is married (510), making up 54.55% of the population. Having a predominantly married population is highly beneficial to the town as married couples usually bring in larger incomes and higher net worth. They also help boost the community's vitality and labour force, as they are most likely to bear children and create the best economic conditions for them. Furthermore, this group also spends more compared to most of their counterparts.

The largest visible minorities in Langenburg are the Chinese (45), Filipino (10) and Hispanic (14). The largest aboriginal population is Metis (15 people).



HOUSEHOLD INCOME





The majority of Langenburg households are above the low income cut-off. The majority (more than 30%) is above the national median income of \$76,000 per year.

The Town of Langenburg has 595 people in its **EMPLOYMENT RATE** labour force (R.M. of Langenburg- 305). About 12.6% of Langenburg residents are self-employed. Langenburg's unemployment rate is low and reaches just 3.2 %. It is below the national average of 7.8%. A regional labour force of 41,500 is available within the area that covers 32,600 square kms.



grew by 10.5%. That reflects positive economic conditions in the community, and implies that people looking for a job are getting matched to an employer.

The participation rate in Langenburg is 63.4% (2016) and in the last two census grew by 8.7%. Growth shows that more people in Langenburg are involved in the labour force and contributing to the community's economy.

AFFORDABLE LIVING

The Town of Langenburg residential community is divided into North and South parts. The majority of homes (235) on the South side of the town were constructed between 1961-1980. In 2006 - 2016 newer homes (45) were built on the North side of the town, where the largest community of young families with children presently live. All town streets (18.04 km) are paved and widely used for walking. Langenburg residents take pride in how **clean** and **safe** their town is!

Langenburg's water supply comes from a 98.9 meter deep well filled with Hadfield Aquifer Water Source. It provides excellent drinking water through a Reverse Osmosis System which was installed in 2008.

Langenburg belongs to former Sunrise Health Region managed by Saskatchewan Health Authority and has great health care facilities that offer many quality health services:

- **Langenburg Health Care Complex:**
 - One full-time family doctor
 - Two rotating part-time family doctors
 - Full-time nurse practitioner
 - Laboratory services
 - X-ray
 - Public Health Office and visiting consulting services
- Centennial Special Care Home: Level 4 facility, managed by Saskatchewan Health Authority, with 45 long-term beds, 2 palliative beds and is the largest employer in the town with 130 full-time and part-time employees;
- "Westhaven Manor" personal care home: Level 1, 9 room facility;
- Langenburg Home Care Service: It was created to assist individuals to remain independent in their homes and have team based care. The Langenburg service is part of the Langenburg Health Centre and employs 10 people who look after 75 nursing clients and about the same number of home service clients. The Home Care Service also offers Meals on Wheels;
- Two pharmacies: Ty's Pharmacy and Langenburg Pharmasave;
- Langenburg Dental Clinic: The provincial government also operates a dental plan in the schools which provides coverage for children from Kindergarten to Grade 9:
- Private wellness services: massage, laser therapy, meal plans, etc.;
- The Langenburg and District Activity Centre: Opened in 1980, it provides person centered support for 15 people with varying abilities. It is the second largest employer in the town as it employs up to 40 people in the area. It also manages three group homes, a workshop and SARCAN depots in Langenburg and Esterhazy.

The Town of Langenburg is close to three hospitals: Russell Health Services Hospital (15 min.), St. Anthony's Hospital, Esterhazy (30 min.), Yorkton Regional Hospital (40 min.).

AGRICULTURE

The largest industry in the Town of Langenburg is agriculture. It covers a 675.66 km2 (260.87 sq mi) area that includes Langenburg, Marchwell and Yarbo. There are 113 farms operating in the Rural Municipality of

Langenburg # 181, where about 136 people are employed.

Local farms are also the main employers for the new Canadians who choose to come to live in this area.

Langenburg is close to three canola crushing plants that are in Harrowby, Manitoba (10 minutes away) and Yorkton, Saskatchewan (40 minutes away).

Total farm area is 151,157 acres. The dominant farming is oil-seed and grain farming (69 farms and 130,159 acres). Our main annual crops are the traditional prairie crops: canola (60 farms), spring wheat (58), alfalfa (33), hay (21), oats (18), barley (11), flax-seed (8), soybeans (6). Our area's soil is deep black loam over a subsoil of heavy clay. Yields of grain grown in this soil are consistently higher and more reliable than yields in other soils. Also we benefit from long daylight hours during the summer, allowing for the production of crops that require a high number of growing degree days. Lower temperatures in winter greatly reduce insect populations, thus limiting the need for pesticides.

The second biggest farming type is beef cattle (24 farms). Other types of farming are: hay farming (7), animal production (7) including a bee farm, that produces over 1 million pounds of pure white honey each year, sheep and goat farming (2), dairy cattle (1), organic farm (1) and others.

The average price of one quarter of land is \$240,000 as of May, 2020.

LANGENBURG CENTRAL SCHOOL

Built in 2016, Pre-Kindergarten to Grade 12 Langenburg Central School is envisioned as being a new "heart" for the community. Designed with an innovative approach, the two-story, 4,685 m2 school features a double-height central atrium circulation area and open concept learning spaces allowing for ample natural light. There are 17 classrooms, a flex-classroom/art, an IA/PAA shop, a home Ec./PAA classroom, a large gymnasium, a small gym/theatre space, a stage, and a fitness classroom/community fitness centre. It also has an open-concept library and multiple common areas (main, senior, junior, and elementary). The school grounds feature two playground structures, and a shale running track.

LDDC is a provincially licensed childcare center established in 2001. The specially designed facility was built in 2010 by the initiative of community volunteers.

An experienced, professional staff offer a fun and educational experience for children as young as 6 weeks old. The LDDC early childcare educators receive ongoing training to ensure an ever changing and engaging environment for children. The programming is developed with guidance from the Ministry of Education. The LDDC employs a full-time staff cook, who is certified in Safe Food Handling techniques. All snacks and the lunch time meals are prepared onsite in health inspected Mosaic Nutrition Centre and follow the Canada Food Guide.

THE GEORGE LAYH THEATRE

The George Layh Theatre is managed by the Langenburg Arts Council (LAC) that is part of OSAC, the Organization of Saskatchewan Arts Councils. The mandate of the Arts Council is to provide opportunities for everybody to experience a variety of art forms. In 1991, upon its incorporation as a not-for-profit organization, the Langenburg Arts Council purchased the community theatre. From the outset, the Arts Council wanted the theatre to become a centre for the arts in the community. Live musical performances along with drama productions, children's theatres, dance recitals and movies took place at the theatre. The Arts Council's dream to renovate the theatre and add rehearsal rooms, stage wings, a receptions area, a large foyer and bathrooms was realized in 2005 with a \$300,000 gift from a local bachelor farmer, George Layh. Strong community support helped the Arts Council raise another \$100,000 to complete the project. Since then a grand piano, stage curtains, lighting, and sound equipment have been added. Since 1991 hundreds of performers have graced the stage of the George Layh Theatre and thousands have enjoyed the events and movies as an audience.

The Arts Council, which has seven standing committees and over 40 community volunteers who sit on those committees, is well-known in the province as a vibrant, successful organization.

- "Stars for Saskatchewan" annual concert series;
- Musical/drama productions. Steel Magnolias, Crimes of the Heart, Little Shop of Horrors, Godspell, Chicago (2018), Annie (2020);
- Annual Adjudicated Art Shows as well as travelling visual exhibits;



LANGENBURG SKATING ARENA

From October to April you can find several tiny skaters learning to skate, a strong Minor Hockey program, a North Central Hockey League Senior Team and lots of recreational skate times! This artificial ice arena's spectator seating area is heated for family and friends to come out and watch their loved ones skate and play hockey!

OUTDOOR SWIMMING POOL

Located in Centennial Park, the 3ft-10ft outdoor heated pool is open from June to August. For over forty years this beautiful, outdoor, L-shaped pool has been a hub of activity in the summer months. It has a grassy area for sunbathers, a large open air structure providing shade, as well as one diving board and a small water slide. In 2021 it will receive a face lift, including a water slide, lazy river, beach entry and splash pad features.

LANGENBURG CURLING RINK

Langenburg's Curling Arena offers 4 sheets of artificial ice to accommodate elementary, high school, ladies, men's, senior's and mixed curling leagues. Bonspiels and funspiels are organized throughout the season. The curling club offers a licensed lounge to cater to all events.

SPORTGROUNDS

Here you will find 5 ball diamonds, 2 newly developed full sized soccer fields, a concession booth and washroom facility that are packed with minor ball, soccer, slopitch and a SESBL team throughout the spring and summer. Some of the major successes over the past three years include: Redeveloping Diamond 4, updating and reconstructing the batting cage, improving the overall appearance of all diamonds and dugouts as well as the development of 2 new soccer pitches.











SKATE PARK

This skate park is an out of ground skate park that includes grind boxes, rails, and ramps for bikers, scooters and skateboarders to enjoy. From spring - fall this small park located in Centennial Park is booming with youth mastering their extreme sport skills.

CROKICURL

A new Canadian game Crokicurl is a large scale hybrid of curling and the board game Crokinole. Originating in Winnipeg, it has become one of Canadians favorite winter past times and is being built all over the country. This is a great family and friends activity that can be enjoyed by all ages. It is located in Centennial Park.

LANGENBURG FITNESS CENTRE

A brand new Fitness Centre is located at the Langenburg Central School and is open to the public during non-school hours.

OUTDOOR SKATING RINK

Located at the Langenburg Central School grounds is a new multipurpose outdoor skating rink. During the Spring, Fall and Summer you will often find kids shooting hoops or having a pick up basketball game. In the winter it becomes the spot to work on your skating and hockey skills. This is a volunteer run outdoor facility.

NEW HORIZON'S CENTRE

The New Horizon's Center is operated by the New Horizon's Club. It is a non-profit community facility utilized as a recreation space and also for gatherings. Many social activities take place in this hall and cater to the older adult population. This spacious and cozy hall includes a small stage, dance floor, shuffle boards, floor curling, and pool tables as well as a basement with a full kitchen facility. The space is fully accessible including its newest addition of a wheel chair ramp as well as a chair lift for the stairs leading to the basement.









LANGENBURG PARKS & PLAYGROUNDS

Langenburg has three well maintained parks and four brand new playgrounds open for the public.

Centennial Park is located in the North part of town just across from the Langenburg Central School. It has a pool, playground, washrooms, skate park, basketball net, green space, benches, and a pergola for various events.



River Heights Park is located in the South part of the town and has a man made hill, green space, a small creek, playground, sand box, bridge walking path, benches and picnic tables.

North Park is located in the North part of the town (4th street North) and has a large green space for ball games, kites or frisbee.
